

The Lord is my Shepherd

(a short message by Nigel Leeming)

Recently I was fortunate to be in a country where I observed Shepherds. Not like the farmers in our countryside with quad bikes and collies but ones who spent time in the field with the sheep and goats. Shepherds more in keeping with the shepherd Jesus refers to in the Bible

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹² The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. ¹³ The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep.

 14 "I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me— 15 just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep.

John 10:11-15

I never got close to Shepherds to ask if the men I saw were hired hands but I suspect they were. It was, however, interesting to see them guide the flocks to field still with greener more lush vegetation as the fields turned yellow under the increasing heat of the sun and lack of water. It was also amusing to see many of these Shepherds were sat under trees looking at their mobile phones.

As we follow on from Easter lets remember that we are guided by the good shepherd, Jesus. He knows us and I hope we know him. The fact that Jesus laid down His life for each of us is not something we should ever take for granted. Jesus cares for each one of us. I know there are members of our Church family who are going through particularly difficult times at the moment let's put our trust and hope in the Good Shepherd. The good shepherd who doesn't need a mobile phone for us to communicate with him.

Next time you read Psalm 23 or sing a version of the hymn let's remember

"The Lord is my shepherd" is a statement of ownership.

"The Lord is my shepherd" is an expression of dependence.

"The Lord is my shepherd" is an admittance of a personal relationship.

Church Meeting: For those that weren't able to join us at the AGM in May please make a note in your diaries that the next Church Meeting will be on the 29th July at 7:30p.m.





- Also we never forget world issues. These are complex and increasingly worrying.



Nepal

It all began with a bridge

Nigel Jones reflects on 12 years of bringing the heart-warming and heart-rending tales from OA's frontline to your attention

n 2014 Outreach
Abroad carried an
article about a
bridge in Nepal. Here is
an extract.

Remote, mountainous terrain in Rukum District, Nepal, makes travel difficult and time-consuming: it

can take 30 hours to walk to the district centre. The lack of easy access means fresh food and medicines are in short supply for villagers, hampering local economies and impacting on peoples' health. After an inspiring training session for church leaders in summer 2012, a number of churches decided to take action. A team from the churches started by constructing a shortcut trail between two of the villages. halving the journey time. However, the route includes a river crossing, consisting of a basic wooden structure which can be treacherous or impossible in monsoon season. In partnership with United Mission to Nepal, (UMN), a grant from Operation Agri is enabling a new, improved bridge to be constructed, providing a safe crossing all year round. As a church-led initiative, the bridge will serve as a witness that the Church is interested in the welfare of the whole community. As the churches start working in the community, people are becoming more open to listen to and network with Christians. (Kat Wagner).



This article was commissioned in late 2013 for publication early in 2014. Since that great story, there have been dozens of articles which I have had the privilege of reading and editing. Some have been truly heart-

warming, as individuals, families and whole communities have testified to being lifted out of subsistence farming into surplus farming, lives saved by local medically trained first responders, and girls given an education which would otherwise have been denied to them.

There have also been heart-rending articles which have brought news of floods and hurricanes washing away vital crops, and of the extreme difficulties faced by partners, and those they served, during the Covid pandemic. Most distressing of all have been the emails bringing articles about the death of partners.

However, despite the problems and tragedies, crops have been grown, new partners have taken up the baton and the gospel has been proclaimed. I continue to be encouraged by these accounts and by the countless supporters who have funded the activities of Operation Agri and our in-country partners.
